MEMBERS' REPORT National Precast Members' Meeting May 2015 Sarah Bachmann, CEO



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1. GOVERNANCE

Finances

The financial report ending 30th April has been prepared and circulated to the Board and is tracking well against budget. A 30/6 Cash Forecast Report and a preliminary draft 2015/16 budget have been prepared for Board consideration.

Director positions

Cathy Inglis has advised she will be resigning from the Board due a new role within Brickworks which forsees no involvement with Austral Precast. National Precast thanks Cathy for her significant contributions as a Board Member.

2. MEMBERSHIP/MEMBER SERVICES

Applications & resignations

Applications – Jack Massey has been internally approved as our first individual Professional Associate Student Member (Engineering, Swinburne University).

Applications by HMV Precast and Milltrack NQ for Precaster membership have both been approved by the Board. Advanced Precast has also applied for Provisional Precaster membership and their factory inspection will be conducted in due course.

Sales material for membership categories

<u>Stand</u> - comprised 3 lightweight printed backing walls, 4 lightweight printed columns, a lightweight printed sky banner, several pieces of GRC furniture/planters (made by Quatro), 3 cubes showing walling finishes (made by Precast Concrete Products, Asurco and Concrete by Design), 3 flooring samples (supplied by Ultrafloor, Austral and Precast Concrete Products) and a GRC counter (Concrete by Design).

<u>NP Handouts</u> - Branded NP USBs, branded hardcover notebooks, new brochures/postcards, Little Book of Concrete, 3 Government book, wallplanners.

<u>Member involvement</u> - 11 companies manned the stand, including Austral, Concrete by Design, Hanson, Reid, Nawkaw, Peikko, Quatro, Reinforced Earth, Strusoft and Ultrafloor. Austral and Hanson both presented case studies in the seminar series.

<u>Leads</u> - Details from 22 qualified contacts were obtained and distributed to participating members. Generally, the exhibition was well attended, with an initial report of just over 7,000 visitors (representing a 7% increase on last year's attendance). An initial breakdown of visitors is:

- 14% architects
- 10% building specialists (incl consultants, sustainability consultants, property specialists)

- 16% building contractors
- 34% management (incl management across all sectors, developers)
- 7% designers
- 17% other.

<u>2016</u> - It is expected that once the Sydney show returns to the city in 2017, numbers will be higher. The 2016 exhibition is being held 4-6th May` at the Melbourne Convention & Exhibition Centre.

4. EDUCATION

Precast seminars (including Introduction to Precast for Structural Engineers)

The Design Guide had been tasked with identifying 10 possible webinar titles, derived from material contained in both the Precast Concrete Handbook and the Design Guide. There has been no progress with this.

Discussions were held with CIA regarding collaboration in the precast education space. A jointly branded precast seminar will be trialled on the Thursday following Concrete 2015. CIA has agreed for NP to assist with ongoing precast programmes (identifying content and organizing speakers) for both national and state events. These would be jointly branded and promoted and NP will receive 20% of gross income.

Hanson's Brace Training Proposal

No progress since last meeting.

AS3850 webinar

Now that an expected publication date for the revised Standard is known, work will commence on organizing this seminar for precasters – both members and non-members.

5. PUBLICATIONS

Publication sales

Sales figures are reported to the Board in monthly financial reports. The new publications brochure was distributed at DesignBUILD to promote sales. Discussions are commencing with SAI Global regarding publication promotions in 2015/16.

Design Guide for Precast

The Board and working group (chaired by Peter Webb) will discuss the title of the document (noting comments from Drew Hakin and Olivia Mirza) and the Board will discuss the need to include additional information on safety in design. Peter is to research and write additional content on deconstruction content. Drawings are to be completed by Strusoft. Photos are to be collated. The publication will then require an internal committee proof, Board signoff, an external proof and will be then handed to the office for production (layout and design). Working Group Action – finalise Design Guide.

Stressing Best Practice

Agreed at the last meeting that development of an Australian best practice will be deferred until existing projects are completed and additional resources are available. The British Precast document was distributed to all members after the meeting and may be used by members in the interim.

6. REPRESENTATION/ADVOCACY

ACRS Australasian Certification Authority for Reinforcing & Structural Steels National Precast representative Bob Connell ITW

Bob advises there has been no action since the February meeting in respect of ACRS developing their plans to include the possible processing of reinforcing from coil, i.e. making mesh, using stirrup benders or bar straighten and bend equipment by a precaster, in their program.

As background, the issue of non-conforming materials including steel is becoming a bigger issue, as a result of worldwide events resulting in construction failures. Without compliance, government bodies and insurance companies are responding with more regulation and higher premiums. Further, large construction companies are constantly

pushing for improvements to their systems to reduce their effort and improve profitability, differentiate themselves, reduce their risk and push risk further down the line as this reduces their insurance costs substantially. When they figure out that it is less risk for them to insist on accreditation of steels and other construction inputs and that there is an associated benefit in reduced insurance premiums, the requirement for ACRS compliance may come, and fairly quickly at this level. Large government projects are likely in the future to require some form of 3rd party accreditation of all reo steel, including that in precast elements, as well as other things such as couplers etc. ATIC is pushing this line heavily and compliance may be more a question of when, rather than if.

ACRS is being encouraged to expand the scheme by a number of stakeholders. QMR have 2 people on the ACRS board and are a key influencer in the direction and requirements for certification. ACRS is also promoting its scheme to a wide range of stakeholders, as a more appropriate method of ensuring conforming materials have been used, over submitted mill certificates or other IS9000 type schemes. One question is how effective they have been to date and how effective their marketing will be in the future. Will the big builders such as Lend Lease and others pick it up and require certification on other than government contracts? Perhaps they will, once they are required to do so for government contracts; this would be the norm for them rather than running 2 different systems. Once one seriously goes down this path, it is likely the others will follow. In fact many large construction projects in Australia are already now heavily influenced by European constructors and designers where this type of requirement is already well entrenched. As for whether it will affect the medium and smaller construction segment, this is probably unlikely until it becomes well established at the top end. At the average warehouse builder level, we are probably a decade or more away from adoption unless there is a regulatory requirement for it. So, uptake is likely to work its way down the food chain, first with government related work (starting at the major risk areas like bridges but working down through other buildings, eg hospitals where there are no-going risk concerns) and eventually all government construction. Then it will be the major builders on their really big jobs and consortium projects and then all their work, and then on down the line to 2nd tier builders etc.

At this stage, it appears there is no intent to require pre-casters who are doing minor processing of a few bars to be accredited; they would only have to show they acquired their bar from an accredited supplier and be able to show an appropriate chain of paperwork in an audit. If however, they are a serious processor producing large quantities of bent bars, welded cages or mesh from wire feeds, or stirrups from a coil fed stirrup bender, then they are exactly like a rebar fabrication shop and may well need the same level of control, paperwork and process as a rebar fab shop. It may become difficult to argue that pre-casters are somehow different from other processors of rebar if they are processing from coil where they have to straighten and then weld into mesh or do substantial bending on auto and semi auto rebar processing machines. Their steel feed needs to come from an accredited supplier and for them to be able to pass the material on as accredited material, it is likely they will need to be accredited as a processor.

Bob is attending an ACRS board meeting just prior to the May Members' Meeting and will provide a full update (and lead a discussion in the Precasters' Forum on *Precasters, steel and ACRS*) at the meeting.

Member Action – NP Precaster members to consider the definition of a steel processor for discussion in the Precasters' Forum.

AEFAC Australian Engineered Fasteners and Anchors Council

National Precast representative Ian Ferrier Reid Construction Systems

Ian advises that the AEFAC Standards part 1 & 2 are now open for public comment with feedback closing on 10th June 2015. The proposed AEFAC Standard addresses the design of safety-critical post-installed and cast-in fasteners to concrete for referencing in the 2016 National Construction Code (NCC). AEFAC Standard Part 1 and Part 2 are available from www.aefac.org.au/resources.php.

The AEFAC Standard Development Committee welcomes all feedback and requests that it be included in the AEFAC Standard Public Comment Template (available below for download) and emailed to <u>djheath@swin.edu.au</u>. Member Action – NP Precaster members to consider providing feedback on the AEFAC Standards.

WHS Authorities

Safe Work Australia: National Code of Practice for Precast, Tilt-up and Concrete Elements in Building Construction

No change to the earlier report that SWA's intention is still to wait until the revised AS3850 is released before revision of the Code is considered.

Member Action – All NP members to provide input to Peter Webb on an industry agreed revised appendix for new Code.

BCA Proposal for Change (PFC) – Mass Enhanced R-value & R-value Calculators

No development since our last meeting. The PFC and Industry Standard are still to be finalised (with Think Brick, CMAA) and submitted to ABCB.

Standards Australia – various Standards

Nagesh advises that there is no change to his February advice that is reprinted below. The commentary, AS3600-2009 Supp 1:2014, was published in early December 2014 and is available on the Standards hub. As advised in the November report, planning for the next revision of AS3600 will now follow, with the committee developing a proposal for a revision of AS3600 that will be submitted in the next round of Prioritisation (2nd February 2015 to 18th March 2015). Standards still to advise the committee of the anticipated meeting/workload for 2015. Action - Nagesh to monitor committee communication.
